TITLE: Ketorolac

OtherNames: Toradol

Classifications: Non-Steroidal Anti-Inflammatory, Analgesic

Ketorolac inhibits prostaglandin synthesis by blocking of the enzyme Pharmacodynamics:

cyclo-oxygenase. This action is responsible for the analgesic and

anti-inflammatory effects.

10 minutes IV/IM Onset:

Peak: 2-3 hours **Duration:** 6-8 hours

Indications: Treatment of mild to severe pain

Contraindications: NSAID or ibuprofen use within previous 6 hours •

Allergy or sensitivity to ASA or NSAIDs

Patient on anticoagulation therapy

Current active bleeding

History of peptic ulcer disease or GI bleed

CVA or TBI in the previous 24 hours

If asthmatic, no prior use of ASA or other NSAID

Pregnant

Known renal impairment

Precautions: History of gastrointestinal tract irritations

Some NSAIDs can cause persistent urinary symptoms

Increased risk of GI bleeding when combined with alcohol

Cardiovascular: Hypertension, edema, vasodilation AdverseReactions:

IM administration: headache, dizziness, nausea, vomiting, sweating,

drowsiness, injection site pain

The most serious associated risks involve the gastrointestinal system,

including; bleeding, perforation and ulceration.

Asthmatic patients are at risk for severe hypersensitive reactions

Drugl nteractions ACE Inhibitors: NSAIDs may diminish the antihypertensive effects of **ACE Inhibitors**

Furosemide and Diuretics: Ketorolac reduces the diuretic response of

furosemide in normovolemic patients

Non-steroidal Anti-inflammatory Drugs (NSAIDS): Concomitant use of Ketorolac and NSAIDS increases the risk of GI side effects.
